Welcome to our **68th Fairbanks auction!** We are pleased to offer a wide mix of coins and medals including classic rarities like the 1918/7-S Standing Liberty Quarter and an 1893 Morgan Dollar in MS-64 grade. Other highlights include an 1877 Indian Cent, a 3-Legged Buffalo Nickel and an 1862 \$3 Gold Indian Princess. Please note that gold and silver were trading at \$1,240 and \$19 at the time of cataloguing.

The estimated values listed after the lots in this auction are based primarily on two sources; Coin World's Coin Values and the Coin Dealer Newsletter (Graysheet). Any price list is out of date by the time one receives it, and large variances occur between publications' listings. Coin pricing is difficult and several sources should always be used for valuation. Prices realized are automatically sent to all mail bidders. If you would like to receive a copy but do not care to participate in the auction, please send \$1 along with a self-addressed, stamped envelope.

TERMS: There are no reserve bids in this auction. All lots are sold as-is. Unlike many auctions, there is no buyer's charge. There can be no returns after the auction is completed except in the case of mail bidders who do not have the opportunity to inspect the lots. All coins are guaranteed genuine. Lots can be picked up after the auction and payment must be with cash or personal check by prior approval. Lots may also be picked up the following week at our store.

Mail bidders should call or write their bids indicating the lot number and the maximum bid they wish to pay. Bids may also be submitted by E-mail to akcoins@mosquitonet.com. Your lots will be purchased for less if possible, and in no case will the maximum be exceeded. Your bids will be called from the book as if you were at the auction in person. Coins will be sent immediately upon receipt of payment and postage will be added to the invoice. If any lots are unsatisfactory, they must be returned within 7 days of receipt. Mail bidders are expected to honor their bids and pay promptly so that consignors do not have to wait for payment.

FOREIGN COINS

ESTIMATE

- 1 **Ancient Coin: Histiaia, Greece**, Tetrobal, 340-170BC, VF+. Histiaia is located on the island of Euboia, and takes its name from a the local nymph/goddess Histiaia. The obverse has a portrait of Histiaia, while the reverse has her seated on the stern of a Greek galley. Littleton Coin Co. offers this coin for \$150. 100.00
- 2 **Ancient Coin: Persia, Sassanian** silver Drachm, circa 500AD, ICG-VF30. Issued by Kavad I during his second reign. The obverse has a portrait, while the reverse is a Zoroastrian fire alter flanked by two attendants. An inexpensive piece of history. 50.00
- 3 **Ancient Coin: Byzantium**, bronze Follis, Maurice Tiberius (582-602AD), year 3, Cyzicus (KYZ) mint. Cyzicus is in Turkey on the sea of Marmara. Large, irregular diameter of about 33mm. This coin is probably a dug coin, showing corrosion, but still with legible details. 50.00
- 4 **British Virgin Islands Proof Set**, 1975. (6) coins from Cent through Dollar with native birds by Gilroy Roberts depicted on the reverses. The actual silver content is 1.2534 troy ounces. Only 32,244 sets were issued and they currently list at \$40 in the KM catalogue. A very attractive set. 40.00
- 5 **Canada \$100 Note**, 1954, XF. Lawson-Bouey signature combination. A neat note from the beginning of Queen Elizabeth's reign. 125.00
- 6 **China 1/20 oz. Gold Panda**, 1989. BU and still sealed in the original plastic. The obverse depicts a cute seated Panda eating bamboo. 100.00+
- 7 **China 500 Yuan, 1 troy oz. Panda**, 2001, SEGS MS-67. The design of a Panda walking through bamboo flows all the way to the edge of the coin. There is no raised rim to break the design. These are currently offered at \$1850 by dealers. Only 41,411 were minted. 1,700.00+
- 8 **Germany - Wurzburg Bishopric**, 1748, 5 Kreuzer. Overall Fine but holed at 12:00. A neat piece, the Bishop had the right to issue coins. A standing Madonna is on the obverse. Wurzburg was eventually absorbed into Bavaria. Also included is a 1904-O **Morgan Dollar**, choice AU with pleasing toning. 2 pcs. 65.00
- 9 **Great Britain Proof Sets**, 1971 to 1973. All are in their original packaging. Three sets. 63.00
- 10 **Great Britain Proof Gold Sovereign**, 1983. A beautiful coin housed in the original velvet case. 21,000 were minted continuing the long tradition of the British Sovereign. It contains .234 troy ounces of gold and currently lists for \$425. 350.00+
- 11 **Hawaii, Half Dollar**, 1883, NGC AU-53. The Kingdom of Hawaii had four denominations struck by the San Francisco Mint (10¢, 25¢, 50¢ and \$1) in 1883 only. 699,974 Half Dollars were minted (most melted) with King Kalakaua on the obverse. See page 413 of Redbook. We have always enjoyed this series and rarely see them. 550.00
- 12 **Early Japan Coins**. Included are two rectangular silver coins - Isshu Gin (1853-69, ASW .0532 oz.) and Ichibu (1837-54, ASW .2759 oz.). These little silver bars "exchanged on their own merits and the prevailing market conditions." (Krause Mishler catalogue). Also included is an iron 4 Mon (1866) from the Sendai mint - a quite scarce issue. The silver coins are EF, the iron coin is only Good because of rust but is legible. Three neat coins issued before Japan adopted western style coinage. 75.00
- 13 **Panama's first coinage**, 1904. While on par with the U.S. Dollar, the first issue of Panama coins contained twice as much silver as their U.S. counterparts. If you traded a U.S. Dollar bill for Panama coinage, you would receive coins with a silver content of 1.44 oz. of silver! "What a country!" Offered here are the 5, 10 and 25 Centesimos, all in Fine condition, and the nearly dollar size 50 Centesimos in VF, but with scattered circulation marks, and probably lightly cleaned. A total of 1.30 ASW. Four coins. 90.00
- 14 **Panama Balboa**, 1947, MS-60+. In 1930, many of the 1904 issue were melted and used to make the new coinage that contained the same amount of silver as their U.S. counterparts. This coin features Balboa on the obverse, and Panamanian Lady Liberty on the reverse, along with coat of arms, and "Pro Mundi Beneficio (For the benefit of the world) on a ribbon. One of the most attractive coins ever struck by the U.S. Mint. 50.00
- 15 **Panama 100 Balboa Gold**, 1980, Proof. The obverse depicts pre-Columbian art of the Cocle Indians. Only 2,411 were struck containing .2346 troy ounces of gold. Housed in its original cachet. 540.00
- 16 **Tibet coins**. Included are (2) Sho - 1918-28 and 1932-42. These are nickel sized copper coins, fairly crude, and Fine for the issue. Also included is a silver Rupee. This coin was issued from 1911-16 and again in 1930-33. It is VF or better and has a portrait of a Tibetan on the obverse and flowering wreath-like design on the reverse. Tibet coins are not common, but surprisingly inexpensive. Three coins from this mountainous country invaded and subjugated by China in 1953. 35.00+
- 17 **Miscellaneous NCLT and Coin Like items**. It is hard to classify these as some countries are real, but there are questions as to whether these "coins" were issued through proper channels! Included are "coins" from (2) **Liberia**, (2) **Marshal Islands**, **Hutt River Province** (seceded from Australia, sort of) and a Klein guitar shaped coin from the **Somali Republic**. No silver, but lots of entertainment. 6 pieces. 60.00

POST-COLONIAL TOKENS

ESTIMATE

- 18 **North American Token**, 1781, NGC VF-25BN. See page 73 of Redbook. East coast merchants around 1818 ordered tokens from both Birmingham and Dublin mints to help a critical coin shortage in the U.S. No one is sure why they were backdated to 1781, but one theory is that was the year Cornwallis surrendered. Hibernia is on the obverse with a sailing ship on the reverse. An affordable post-colonial token. 200.00+
- 19 **Civil War Tokens**. The first is an 1863 store card for Staudinger's Confectioner in New York City and is a nice XF. The second is an Army/Navy token 224/326 in VF but a little crusty. Two pieces. 40.00

HALF CENTS

- 20 **Classic Head Half Cent**, 1832, PCGS Ch. AU-55. This series ran from 1809 to 1835 (1836 was a proof only issue). The 1832 has the second lowest mintage after the 1831 issue with only 51,000 struck. The coin offered here has very sharp details and wonderful surfaces. 250.00
- 21 **Half Cent**, 1853, ANACS MS-63BN. A uniform brown planchet with no spotting. This short lived series was only struck from 1849 to 1857, and mintages are relatively low. 395.00

LARGE CENTS

- 22 **Liberty Cap Large Cent**, 1795, S-78, plain edge, PCGS VG-10. Amazingly, this coin has no real problems worth mentioning and exhibits nice uniform chocolate brown color. This short lived series was only minted for four years (1793 to 1796). The most recent examples we have found at auction in this grade are selling for \$822. The PCGS website lists this grade at \$875. Coin World lists it at \$950 in VG-8. 850.00-950.00
- 23 **Draped Bust Large Cents**, 1798 and 1802. The 1798 is deep brown with porosity and only grades AG. The 1802 is overall Good and is the stemless variety. Although the fields are brown, the highlights appear to have been cleaned. Two pieces. 100.00
- 24 **Matron Head Large Cent**, 1820, N.11. A nice VF with slightly rotated reverse die, the large date variety. 80.00
- 25 **Large Cents**, 1830 and 1831. Both are Good. Two pieces. 50.00
- 26 **Large Cents**, 1835 and 1838. Both are Good to VG. A nice pair. Two pieces. 50.00+
- 27 **Large Cents**, 1840 and 1841. Fine and VG/F respectively. Two pieces. 60.00
- 28 **Large Cents**, 1851 and 1852. Here are a pair of heartbreakers. The 1851 is overall AU in detail, but is too bright from a cleaning and some marks also noted. The 1852 is a cleaned XF. 2 pieces. 90.00-110.00
- 29 **Braided Hair Large Cent**, 1853, PCGS MS-64RB. The mint red silhouettes the devices giving the coin an attractive appearance. The fields are immaculate with no marks visible to the eye. The grade is possibly held down because of two toning spots on the obverse. PCGS lists these at \$975. 650.00-950.00

FLYING EAGLE & INDIAN CENTS

- 30 **Flying Eagle Cent Lot**. Includes: (2) 1857, one grading Good but with numerous marks, the other VG but one scratch noted; and (2) 1858, one AG/G and the other G, but numerous marks noted. 4 pieces. 60.00
- 31 **Indian Cents**, 1859 and 1860. The 1859 is a one year type coin with no reverse shield and grades VG. The 1860 is VG, but the surfaces are a bit rough. Two pieces. 27.00
- 32 **Indian Cents**, 1862 and 1864 copper-nickel. The 1862 is Ch. VF to XF and very attractive while the 1864 is Good. Two pieces. 50.00
- 33 **Bronze Indian Cent**, 1864 with "L," PCGS AU-58. A very popular coin that has all the appearance of a mint state coin. Mostly brown with mint red still visible. 1864 was a transitional year with copper-nickel and two different bronze cents minted. The PCGS holder is a little "scuffy" but the coin is very nice for the grade. 400.00

35	Indian Cent , 1870, PCGS VF details, environmental damage. A more difficult date in the series. This example shows the natural brown surfaces that are unfortunately uniformly granular.	125.00-200.00
36	Indian Cents , 1872 and 1873. The 1872 is a key date and is a problem-free Good. The 1873 is also Good. Two pieces.	125.00
37	Indian Cent , 1877, PCGS G-04. It is always important to only buy certified examples of this date, even in low grades. There are too many altered dates floating around. This is the key in the series and is in great demand in all grades.	550.00-650.00
38	Indian Cents , 1893, 1895, 1897 and 1898. All of these are well matched XF examples. All have natural brown surfaces and the only item of note is a small reverse scratch on the 1893. 4 pieces.	49.00
39	Indian Cent , 1908-S, PCGS Ch. VF-35. A borderline XF with a nice medium brown planchet. Only two Indian Cents have mint marks, the 1909-S considerably pricier.	150.00
40	Indian Cent , 1909-S, PCGS F-12. Even though the 1877 is the key date, the 1909-S has by far the lowest mintage at only 309,000 struck. This is a great mid-grade example of this rare date. Lists on PCGS website at \$540.	500.00+
41	Late Date Better Grade Indian Cents . All of the following grade AU or better and includes: 1901 (questionable color), 1904, 1905 (most likely mint state, but dark obverse toning on the right side), 1906 very choice, and 1907. Five pieces.	85.00

42	Nice lot of Lincoln Cents . 1909 XF; 1911 VF; 1916 VF/XF; 1917 XF; 1918 XF+; 1918-S VF; 1919 XF; 1919-S XF; 1920 XF; 1920-D XF/G (reverse is very weak); 1920-S VF/XF. 11 pieces.	40.00
43	Lincoln Cents , 1909-VDB, 1912, 1913, 1914. All XF, nice chocolate brown. Well matched. Four pieces.	53.00
44	Lincoln Cent , 1909-S VDB, PCGS Genuine, XF details, damaged. Strong XF details but there is a somewhat deep old scratch on Lincoln's chest. This is another date that is important to certify in all grades. A classic U.S. rarity that is well known outside the numismatic community. The closest comparison we can find for this is an example Heritage sold at auction 9-28-13 which was scratched with XF details. It sold for \$822.	800.00+
45	Lincoln Cents , 1910 and 1910-S. MS-63 and XF respectively. Two pieces.	85.00
46	1913 Lincoln Cents . Include 1913 XF; 1913-D Ch. XF; and 1913-S VG to Fine. A very nice trio, 3 pieces.	75.00
47	Lincoln Cents , 1913-D and 1927. Graded Ch. AU-55 and MS-64 respectively by PCI . PCI is a third party grading service that has gone through many different ownerships. At certain times, their grading appears to be absolutely correct, while at other times they over grade or ignore problems. The 1913-D listed here is a great coin that appears to be mint state (red and brown). We grade the 1927 MS-63/64 but can certainly see the case for the higher grade. Two pieces.	100.00
48	Lincoln Cents , 1913-S and 1914-S. Both are VG. We tend to concentrate on the 1914-D and forget that the 1914-S is also a tough date. Two pieces.	40.00
49	Lincoln Cents , 1914-D and 1917-S. NGC G-6BN and NGC F-15BN respectively. The 1914-D is a key date in the popular Lincoln Cent series. Two pieces.	180.00
50	Lincoln Cents , 1915, 1915-D, 1916. Grades XF; XF with corrosion (?), XF+. All nice brown, the 1915-D a little lighter. The 1916 has a nice struck through area on the reverse. A comparable lot to the previous. Three pieces.	80.00
51	Lincoln Cents , 1922-D and 1924-D. Both are VG. The 1922-D has the weak obverse and strong reverse with most of the wheat lines showing. Two pieces.	67.00
52	Lincoln Cents from the 1920s . Included are: 1921 VF; 1921-S cleaned VF; 1923 VF+; 1923-S F; 1924 XF/AU; 1924-S VF; 1925 XF; 1925-D F/VF, scr.; 1925-S VF; 1926 VF/XF; 1926-D VF/XF; 1927 AU; 1927-D XF; 1927-S VF; 1928 VF/XF; 1928-D XF; 1928-S XF+; 1929 VF; 1929-D XF; 1929-D VG/F; 1929-S XF. 21 coins.	82.00
53	Lincoln Cents from the early 1930s . Included are 1930 XF; 1930-D XF; 1930-S VF/XF; 1931 VF/XF; 1932 XF; 1932-D XF; and 1933 XF. A nice way to end this run of high circulated grade Lincolns. 7 pcs.	25.00

- 54 **Lincoln Cents**, 1934-D and 1935. Both are MS-63 with lots of mint red. We note a rather large die break on the reverse of the 1934-D running through the wheat stalk. Two pieces. 30.00
- 55 **Lot of 400 Lincoln Cents, 1909-1930s**, AG to XF. Included are at least (5) 1909, all the teen years, most of the 1920s and 1930s (mostly teens and 20s). Obviously, no key or semi-key mints. 400 pieces, easily worth.... 125.00+
- 56 **Proof Lincoln Cent**, 1940, **PCGS Proof 64Red**. A beautiful proof in an old PCGS "rattler" holder. 100.00
- 57 **Proof Lincoln Cent**, 1942, Proof-63 to 64, mostly mint red with faint toning. 50.00+
- 58 **Early Proof Lincoln Cents**. Included are: 1942 Proof-64, mostly red with light overtones; (3) 1951, a Proof-64/65 with pretty toning, another Proof-64 but a bit cloudy, and a Proof-60 example heavily toned and not attractive; finally, a 1953 Proof-64 toned. Five pieces. 245.00
- 59 **BU Cent Rolls**, 1955-S and 1959. Nice rolls, mostly mint red. Also included are 51 Cents from the 1920s. A good mix with some better grades. 151 pieces total. 35.00
- 60 **Lincoln Cent Error - Repunched Mint Marks**. Included are 1938-D/D, 1938-S/S/S, 1942D/D and 1944-D/D. The double and triple mint marks are readily apparent and can be found in the "Cherry Pickers" book. The S/S/S is awesome!!! All are about MS-63, and red. A very nice assortment, 4 coins. 52.00
- 61 **1960-D Lincoln Cent Repunched Mint Marks**. This is an amazing collection of five different varieties, all 1960-D large date cents: D/D north; D/D inverted; D/D west; D/D west (different); and D/D west (different from the previous two). All readily apparent, MS-63 red. Five coins. 75.00
- 62 **Lincoln Cent Doubled Die**, 1960-D/D, Small Date over Large Date, **PCGS MS-63Red**. This is a fascinating coin! Coneca: 1-0-III. There are several varieties of this. First, this is a Doubled Die obverse with the small date over the large date. Unlike the picture in Cherrypicker's Guide, the top stem on the "6" shows three distinct tails! The mint mark was repunched with the secondary "D" north and actually touching the 9. There is a good picture of this on the coppercoins.com website. The radical errors on this coin make it fascinating. Cherrypicker's lists this at \$250. 150.00+
- 63 **Lincoln Cent Doubled Die**, 1963-D. This doubled die is fairly common, showing mostly inside the 3 and on 6 of the date. Also included are the last of the **repunched mint marks**: 1957-D/D; 1959-D/D/D, 1961-D/horizontal D; and 1964-D/D. All are about MS-63, red. 75.00
- 64 **Lincoln Cent Doubled Die**, 1972/72, **PCGS MS-63RB**. The 1972 Doubled Die Cents are very bold. All lettering and the date show strong doubling. No one thought that we would have a recurrence of what happened in 1955, but the mint came through! Graysheet "ask" is currently \$375. These were much more expensive years ago. 400.00

TWO AND THREE CENTS

- 65 **Two Cent Piece**, 1868, **PCGS Proof-62RB**. This is a gorgeous coin with deep mirrors and uniform deep orange surfaces. Approximately 600 proofs were minted that year. PCGS lists these at \$400. 400.00
- 66 **Three Cent Silver**, 1853, **NGC VF-20**. A pleasing mid-grade example of this popular type coin. 65.00+
- 67 **Three Cent Nickels**. Includes 1865 F+, 1866 F, 1867 F/VF, and 1868 VG. Four pieces. 78.00
- 68 **Three Cent Nickel**, 1880, **PCGS Proof-63**. 3,955 proofs were struck this year. The proof fields are not deep which is typical. The numerals have full sharp vertical lines as one would expect. 350.00

HALF DIMES

- 69 **Seated Liberty Half Dime**, 1860, **NGC MS-63CAC**. A very pretty coin with deep blue at the edges, lighter at the center, darker on the reverse. 250.00-300.00
- 70 **Seated Liberty Half Dime**, 1870. A strong F/VF. Also included is a 1908-O **Barber Dime** in XF with natural medium gray toning. A pair of very nice type coins. Two pieces. 60.00

71	Shield Nickel , 1867 no rays, F/VF but lightly cleaned. Also included is the rare 1914-S Buffalo Nickel grading VF or higher in terms of detail, but the coin is very dark and has numerous marks. Two pieces.	70.00+
72	Shield Nickel , 1867 no rays, PCGS MS-64. Mostly untoned with a bold die crack near the motto.	345.00
73	Shield Nickels , 1868 and 1870. The 1868 is a nice VG, and the 1870 is F/VF, possibly cleaned. 2 pcs.	75.00
74	Liberty Head Nickel , 1883 no cents variety. PCI MS-63 and we concur with the grade.	50.00
75	1913 Buffalo Nickel Set . All of these are Type I and include: 1913 VG; 1913-D Fine; and 1913-S G/VG with some marks noted on the reverse and a bit bright. Three pieces.	75.00
76	Buffalo Nickel , 1915, NGC MS-61. Nicely struck, golden brown toning on both sides.	60.00
77	Buffalo Nickels , 1915-D and 1915-S, G/VG and Fine respectively. The rim on the reverse of the 1915-S has some noticeable rim marks. Two pieces.	100.00
78	Buffalo Nickels : Included are: 1917-S AG; (2) 1919 AG and F; 1924-D Good (marks); (3) 1925 Good; (2) 1931-S Fine (better date); 1934 G; (2) 1934-D VF and XF; and 1937-S XF. 13 pieces.	95.00
79	Buffalo Nickel , 1921, PCGS MS-63. Lustrous with light gold overtones, and we note some interesting clash marks on the reverse.	300.00
80	Buffalo Nickel , 1921-S, VG+. A pleasing example of this key date. The date is quite strong for the grade with all digits showing.	110.00
81	Buffalo Nickels , 1924-S and 1925-D. VG and Fine respectively. A pair of scarce dates. Two pieces.	67.00
82	Buffalo Nickel , 1925-S, PCGS AU-53. Ex our 3-18-95 auction, Lot #95. This is a more difficult date that some experts believe is undervalued. This example has plenty of luster along with faint blue overtones.	275.00
83	Buffalo Nickel , 1928-D, PCGS MS-64. A beautiful coin with a full rounded horn and great luster.	175.00
84	Buffalo Nickels , 1935-D and 1938-D. The 1935-D is graded by PCI as an MS-64 and has uniform gold toning. We believe the coin has been lightly cleaned and should grade MS-60 cleaned. The 1938-D is graded MS-65 by PCGS and has light blue overtones. We also note some fly speck toning visible under a loupe. Two pieces.	95.00
85	Buffalo Nickel , 1937, NGC MS-66. Very lustrous with immaculate surfaces.	75.00
86	3-Legged Buffalo Nickel , 1937-D, ANACS AU details, net graded XF-45, scratched. Strong detail with a fully rounded horn and soft luster. There are a couple of scratches under a loupe at the nose and forehead of the Indian, but they are not really visible to the naked eye. This is one of the most popular coins in U.S. numismatics.	850.00
87	Buffalo Nickel , 1938-D/S, PCGS MS-65. Well struck with a full rounded horn. This is a popular variety with the repunched mint mark very bold. There are 5 combinations, with this one being the D/D/D/S which is pictured in the Cherrypicker's Guide.	150.00
88	Jefferson Nickels , 1938-S and 1950-D. The 1938-S is a very clean MS-64 to MS-65 while the key 1950-D is MS-64. A very nice pair.	25.00
89	Jefferson Nickel BU set . A complete set from 1938 to 2006 with proofs included from 1968 to 2006. Most coins are brilliant with some exhibiting gold toning. This beautiful set was apparently sold by Littleton Rare Coins and is housed in their custom albums including slip cases.	400.00

90	Capped Bust Dime , 1832, ANACS AU-50 details, scratched. A very appealing coin with natural surfaces and still retaining luster. There is one old scratch in the obverse field.	350.00-400.00
91	Seated Liberty Dimes , 1845, 1851, and 1883. They grade VG/F cleaned, Good (stained/cleaned) and XF cleaned respectively. Three pieces.	58.00
92	Barber Dime , 1892, PCGS AU-50. Medium gray toning on the obverse, lighter on the reverse. A great type coin from the first year of issue.	70.00
93	Barber Dimes . From 1899 to 1916, AG to VG, most being Good. 64 pieces.	112.00
94	Barber Dime , 1901, PCGS MS-64. Lustrous, light toning just starting to form.	350.00
95	Barber Dimes , 1906-O and 1909-S. The 1906-O is a scarce date and grades Fine with a full "Liberty" showing. A few scattered obverse marks are noted as well as some irregular toning. The 1909-S has been cleaned and grades Good. Two pieces.	48.00
